#### Feedback Obtained

Student-feedback forms are developed by the college which are given to the students to state their feedback on the teachers along seven parameters like, The teacher's effectiveness in teaching the subject, Clarity of teacher's voice his Communication Skills, Teacher's use of examples and illustrations to make understand the topic they discuss, their readiness to extend extra help when needed, Punctuality of teachers in the classroom, Level of discipline maintained in the class by the teacher and his Interaction with students. Randomly 10 students from each class fill the forms for each teacher. For analysis, average is taken out of each parameter of each teacher and on the basis of the average scores, final score of the teacher is calculated. Later, this analysis is handed over to the Mathematics department for further processing. If some teacher draws poor feedback from the students and if there are some remarks by the students to be taken note of, the head of the department brings those to the notice of the concerned teacher so that he/she takes remedial measures against the deficiencies pointed out and improves upon them. It also helps in keeping track of the quality being delivered to the students in terms of teaching. Students' Satisfaction Forms also are filled in order to procure feedback of the students on eight parameters viz., Teaching-Learning Process, Conduct of Examination, Library Facilities, Extra-curricular facilities, Sports Facilities, Security Services, Grievance Redressal and Drinking Water and Washroom Facilities. Based on the feedback, action is taken by the authorities to step up the infrastructural facilities for the students. Computer Science and Information Technology departments measure the feedback through Online Google Form. Likewise feedback is also obtained from parents through the scheduled Parents - Teachers Meeting. Their suggestions and concerns are noted down and required measures are taken to create more students centric learning atmosphere. Once in a year, alumni meeting is called by the college where in all alumni willingly attend the meet and share their views, experience etc. that we incorporate with an aim to make college grow in right direction.

2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Various approaches of mentoring are employed by teachers in different subjects. Students are mentored in the college through regular teaching learning process by teachers, who astutely work on the students requiring further help by providing question banks, synoptic answers, reference material, etc. Whereas the brighter students are mentored through various e- resources extra referencing suggested by the teachers. The experienced senior faculty members are invited to guide the students for improving their answer writing skills and hence getting better grades. The students are made to prepare answers on important topics and guidance is provided to improve on scoring in exams. The students from vernacular medium schooling are provided the option of learning English better through the certificate Programmes in English. Individual teachers make students improve language skills through Report writing, power-point presentations, assignment writing as part of the internal evaluation system. All the departments together organized a total of 38 certificate courses for choice based learning and skill development in students to make them more equipped for future. The college has a counseling cell for students to provide the emotional and psychological support required by students in difficult situations of personal life to make them more focused and positive. The peer mentoring is done in various departments wherein the student group of two or three are formed and group study is motivated in them. The constitution of group is done by teachers in such a way that the students with specific abilities are clubbed appropriately for mutual benefit. This kind of mutual mentoring reaps better benefits, since peer learning aids the conceptual study in a much efficient manner, also inculcating regular learning by discussion and query. Alumni students are invited to deliver a guidance and motivational talk regularly to initiate the need to excel in their academics to follow with the professional excellence. Certain eminent Academicians, Motivational speakers, Doctors, Scientists are invited frequently to generate the awareness and motivation to pursue academic excellence and overall development in order to develop into an intellectually motivated conscientious citizens of the world.

Students' Council is the primary platform in the College, which helps to inculcate leadership qualities amongst the students. As per the Maharashtra Universities Act 2016, it was expected that the Students' Council be formed by conducting elections but due to lack of any further guidelines in this regards from the University, the Students' Council was formed as per the previous guidelines prescribed by the University. The First merit rank holders of each class and representatives from different activities like N.C.C., N.S.S., Sports etc. were selected to form the Students' Council for 2018-19 in the college. In addition to these representatives, two girl students were selected as lady representative out of the selected Students' Council for the Academic year 2018-19. The Student Council helps in communicating ideas, interest and various demands of the students to the college management and administration. The Student Council also gives suggestions regarding the development and betterment of college in the interest of the students. An election was conducted within the selected Students' Council members Ms. Neha Mishra was elected unopposed as General Secretary of the Students' Council. The Students' Council was co-ordinated by Dr. Seema Manchanda, Associate Professor, Department of Chemistry. In addition, the activity heads from N.C.C. (Lt. Cdr B.S.Wadekar) and sports (Dr. Harish Dubey) were also nominated to assist the co-ordinator. The students participate enthusiastically and excel in sports and cultural activities. Extension activities are carried out through NCC, NSS, DLLE units of the college. Various personality development and value education programmes organized for the students in the College by the UGC sponsored GSC, ASC, WSC, Career and Counselling Cell, Centre for Yoga, aim at instilling values and cultivating a healthy mind and a healthy body. WDC, Special Cell and Grievance Redressal Cell of the college ensure gender and social equity and provide help, support and guidance whenever required

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

• The total area of Library Building is 6000 sq.ft having ground floor and first floor. • Ground Floor (3000 sq.ft) has one Librarian's office, Technical Section, Reference Section,

**Research and Development**

The College believes that research is an integral part of teaching. Several initiatives are taken for sensitizing / promoting research culture. Faculty members are encouraged to participate and organize research meets / workshops / seminars / conferences and present research papers and publish in reputed journals. For this necessary help and guidance is provided to the faculty members by the college and management. There are 09 research centres and 22 research guides in the college. So far 63 students have been awarded Ph. D. Degree under the guidance of this research guides in different subjects.

**Examination and Evaluation**

• With the grant of autonomy, Board of Examination Committee was constituted under University guidelines. • For the smooth conduct of the administrative work of exam, RESO software was used. • The College is having academic autonomy and follows Credit Based Grading Semester System in UG and PG programmes Evaluation. • The evaluation has been revised to the 60:40 continuous evaluation pattern involving 60 of marks for theoretical semester end examination and 40 of

7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

We have lush green Campus spread over 14 acres (Total 20 acres including B. K. Birla Public School). A green house is maintained by the Dept. of Botany. Bottle Gardens, Bonsai Plants, fish aquariums are being developed with the dual purpose of aesthetic beauty of campus and commercial skill development in students. Safety audits, Energy audits are regularly conducted in the college. Also entrepreneurial projects like the low cost herbal hand sanitizer Nirmalaya flower based perfume etc. has been developed by undergraduate students.

Environmental Awareness: 2018-19

## 7.2 – Best Practices

Best Practice 1. Goal: To encourage students to earn more credits by attending interdisciplinary certificate courses. Content: As a part of the autonomy, the syllabi of all courses were revised during 2018-19. Apart from the usual curriculum, students must acquire an overall expertise in their field. Keeping this goal in mind, each department of the college has taken initiatives to offer a certificate course of 2 credits / semester. The students were given freedom to choose their courses according to their requirements and interest. Strong Research Culture - The College was established in 1972, by Kalyan Citizens' Education Society with the blessings of Late Syt. B. K. Birla ji and Late Smt. Sarala ji Birla. The College offers 22 UG, 27 PG courses in Arts, Science and Commerce and 09 Ph. D. programs in the subject of Botany, Biotechnology, Physics, Chemistry, Zoology, Microbiology, Hindi, History and Economics. A Ph. D. program is being introduced in Commerce. The College also conducts PG Diploma in Bio-nanotechnology and A-DMLT. The UGC has sanctioned a Community College for Diploma in Accounting and Taxation in 2015-16. The College has been accredited by NAAC with 5 Star Status in 2002, reaccredited (2nd Cycle) with 'A' Grade (CGPA - 3.37) in 2008 and reaccredited (3rd Cycle) and awarded 'A' Grade (CGPA - 3.58) in 2014. The College was granted 'College with Potential for Excellence' status by UGC (2010) and presently granted 'College of Excellence' status (2015-20). The departments of Botany, Chemistry, Microbiology, Physics and Zoology have been awarded 'Star Status' by the DBT, GOI in 2017. Recently, the departments of Mathematics, Information Technology and Computer Science have received support from 'DBT-Star College Scheme'. The College has been sanctioned funds under the 'FIST' Programme of DST to strengthen Teaching and Research Facilities in all Science Departments. B. K. Birla College has a vibrant work-culture with holistic approach to education. The teaching - learning process is supported by the use of ICT, interactive exercises, projects, assignments, etc. in addition to chalk and talk method. The College believes that research is an integral part of teaching. Several initiatives are taken for sensitizing / promoting research culture. Faculty members are encouraged to participate and organize research meets / workshops / seminars / conferences and present research papers and publish in reputed journals. For this necessary help and guidance is provided to the faculty members by the college and management. There are 09 research centers and 22 research guides in the college. So far 59 students have been awarded Ph. D. Degree under the guidance of this research guides in different subjects. In last Five years (2014-15 to 2018-19) faculty members have published 172 papers in reputed International Journals, 103 papers in National Journals, 90 papers

in the proceedings in the International conferences and 78 papers in the proceedings of National Conferences / Seminars. 80 books (Text and Reference) have been authored by the faculty members. They have also contributed 51 chapters in different national and international reference books. The faculty members undertake minor and major research projects funded by University of Mumbai, UGC, AYUSH, etc. In last Five years, 5 Major and 35 Minor Research Projects have been completed by the faculty members. 2 faculty members have received industrial consultancy. 10 Patents have been filed in last five years.
